- There are many indigenous, religious, or longstanding minority ethnic groups include:
- Arameans, Assyrians, Armenians, Bahrani, Baloch, Coptic, Cappadocian Greeks, Cypriots, Druze, Greeks, Jews, Maronites, Nubians, Chaldeans, and Kurds.



The Dhimmi

- When the Arabs conquered the Middle East & N. Africa.
- they set about the project of Arabization.
- This meant that they raised the taxes on Non-Muslims, restricted government access for Non-Muslims, and made Non-Muslims second-class citizens in an apartheid state.
- ► This was called "the Dhimmi" or the "Peoples under Protection".
- ➤ You could escape this second-class status by doing two simple things:







The Dhimmi

- ▶ (1) switch your prevailing language to Arabic and
- ▶ (2) convert to Islam.
- ► You would then become an Arab and escape the Dhimmi status.
- Many people took the offer, preferring wealth in this life to preserving their identities as Christians or Jews or Zoroastrians or whatever religion they happened to be before the Islamic Conquest.
- And so, the variety of ethnicities of the Middle East became absorbed into a new enlarging Arab ethnicity.










1. Coptic Egyptians

- The word Coptic means native Egyptian.
- All the Coptic are Christians.
- Egypt became Christian by the 2nd cen. A.D.
- Egypt was completely Christian until the Arab invasion in 642
 A.D
- Most of the Coptic are orthodox Byzantine church.
- Coptics are the largest ethno-religious minority in Egypt and the Middle East, they are 12 million people.

2. The Assyrians

- > The Assyrians of today are the descendants of the ancient Assyrian people.
- They are one of the earliest civilizations emerging in the Middle East and have a history spanning over 4000 years.
- The official language of the Assyrian churches is Syriac, a dialect of Aramaic, the language Jesus would have spoken.

2. The Assyrians

- Assyrians are not Arabian or Arabs, and their religion is not Islam.
- Assyrian are known as Syriacs, they are predominately Christians.
- Most of the world's 2-4 million Assyrians live around their traditional homeland, which comprises parts of northern Iraq, Syria, Turkey and Iran.
- Assyrians have been the victims of persecution for centuries, including the Assyrian genocide, in which the Ottomans killed at least 250,000 Assyrians during World War I.





2. The Assyrians

- In recent years, many have fled to neighboring countries to escape persecution from Islamists militias during the Iraq War and, most recently, by the terrorist group ISIS.
- Members of the Assyrian diaspora are spread-out all-over world, including roughly 100,000 in the United States, according to U.S. Census Bureau survey.
- Iraqi Assyrians have faced increased persecution following the U.S.-led invasion in 2003,
- > -including attacks on Assyrian churches some estimate that 60 % of Iraqi Assyrians have fled the country since the Iraq War began.





3- The Kurds/Kurdish

- > The Kurds are one of the indigenous peoples of the Mesopotamian plains and the highlands,
- In what are now south-eastern Turkey, northeastern Syria, northern Iraq, north-western Iran and south-western Armenia.
- Between 15 to 20 million Kurds, They make up one of ethnic group in the Middle East, but they have never obtained a permanent nation state.







3. The Kurds/Kurdish

- Most Kurds are Sunni Muslims, and among them are many who practice Sufism and other mystical sects.
- > The principal unit in traditional Kurdish society was the tribe, typically led by a sheikh or an Aga, whose rule was firm.
